Community Development

BUILDING PERMITS & INSPECTIONS

In fiscal year 2019-2020, the Building Division received *2,493* building permit applications for review and conducted *3,587* inspections. The permit counter remained open throughout the pandemic to ensure the issuance of building permits.

BUSINESS TAXES

In fiscal year 2019-20, *1,125* business tax renewal letters were mailed, and *151* new business license applications were received.

NEW PERMITTING SOFTWARE

In the Fall of 2020, the city changed to a new building permit software, which allowed for several operational improvements for customers and staff, including:

- The on-line scheduling of inspections and submittal of smaller building permit applications
- Data collection in the field for inspections and code enforcement
- The payment of business tax and building permit applications by credit card both in person and on-line

CODE COMPLIANCE

In fiscal year 2019-2020, City Code Compliance staff responded to *611* requests for assistance for several violation types including illegal signs, building and property maintenance, trash accumulation, illicit discharge, animal violations, and permit violations.

The Code Enforcement Board heard *30* cases.

FREE TREE GIVEAWAY

On October 19, 2020, residents came by the Public Works Compound to pick up two free trees each. A total of *450* trees were given away for planting to enhance the city's tree canopy.

STREET TREE PROGRAM

The City planted *6* trees as part of the residential street tree program in 2020.

Engineering

FOLLY FARM NATURE PRESERVE GAZEBO

Last year, Mr. George Weiss approached the City of Safety Harbor with his vision of creating a gathering space amenity at Folly Farm Nature Preserve. In August 2019, Mr. Weiss donated **\$25,000** to the City to help create that vision. Fulfilling Mr. Weiss's request, the City purchased a 20-foot wide gazebo kit from Amish Country Gazebos located in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania. The City took delivery of the package in October 2019. Engineering staff and Leisure Services staff collaborated on a final design. In July 2020, construction was completed and included the assembly of the Gazebo structure, construction of a paver patio, installation of an ADA wooden ramp, and installation of a GRASSMAT® walkway. GRASSMAT® is a heavy-duty extruded polyethylene rollout matting system to provide ADA access through the park and leading up to the new Gazebo. The new Gazebo and amenities fulfilled the vision of Mr. George Weiss and offers a distinct setting for various celebrations within Folly Farm Nature Preserve.



ESPIRITU SANTO SPRINGS & WASHINGTON BRENNAN WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT

The Espiritu Santo Springs and Washington Brennan Water Main Replacement project designed in 2020, and currently under construction, will replace approximately **11,600** LF of aging water main. Construction began in November 2020. The majority of new water main will be installed via horizontal directional drill to minimize impacts to City roadways, sidewalks, driveway, trees, and other infrastructure. The process consists of drilling a path at the desired location and depth, then pulling the water main into place. Construction will continue through 2021 with an anticipated completion date in December 2021.

MAIN STREET AT 3RD AVENUE BRICK INTERSECTION REPAIR



The construction of the brick intersection rehabilitation project at Main Street and 3RD Avenue was completed in November 2020. The Engineering in-house design consisted of a redesign of the intersection, sub-base, and grading to improve the drainage and longevity of the intersection. Improvements included the removal of the existing brick and underlying asphalt, and replacing with 16 inches of base material, a thin sand layer, and larger brick coated with polymeric sand. The improvements allow for better drainage of the intersection. The larger bricks will be less likely to move and the polymeric sand will resist movement of the sand, both of which will provide for longevity to the intersection.

MARINA PIER EMERGENCY REPAIRS



In November 2020, Hurricane ETA damaged a portion of the pier at Safety Harbor Marina. Engineering coordinated with Augustine Construction to perform immediate repairs of the damaged railing, stringers, and decking for approximately *40* feet starting at the entrance of the Pier. Repairs were completed in two days.

GREEN SPRINGS WATER MAIN REPLACEMENT

Replacement of approximately *5,200* feet of aging water main was completed within the Green Springs subdivision in March 2020. The project construction lasted one year, and the majority of new water main was installed via horizontal directional drill to minimize impacts to City roadways, sidewalks, driveway, trees, and other infrastructure.

STREET RESURFACING & MISCELLANEOUS ROAD WORK

The street resurfacing, full depth reclamation, and miscellaneous road work project was completed in December 2020. Work also included sidewalk, handicap ramp upgrades, and curb modifications. Streets included were within the North Bay Hills, Tangelo Grove Village, Brooklyn, Palm View Terrace, and South Green Springs subdivisions.

LIBRARY ADDITIONAL PARKING

Low impact design parking spaces at the northeast parking lot of the Safety Harbor Library was designed by Engineering and constructed by Morelli Landscaping in December 2020. Seven (7) additional low impact design parking spaces were added that included sand sub-base, turf block and pea gravel with a concrete curb boarder. These spaces will allow for infiltration of stormwater and better drainage conveyance within the parking lot. Additionally, rehabilitation of existing turf block parking within the north parking lot area were included with this project.

Fire Department

OVERVIEW



2020, the Fire Department had many accomplishments, including one retirement that saw the departure of FF/EMT John Weston who retired after *28* years of great service and dedication to the community, the promotion of Joshua Pennino to the position of District Chief, well as the appointment of Andrew Hawkins to the position of District Chief.

Throughout the year, the department managed their response to the COVID-19 disaster which saw the implementation of new personal protective equipment and response procedures. The department also instituted new safety measures to assist in reducing any unwanted spread of the coronavirus between firefighters. The department deployed one firefighter to assist with the transport of COVID-19 positive patients within Safety Harbor, Clearwater, and Largo. In addition to COVID-19, the department deployed one firefighter to the panhandle to assist in emergency response and recovery following Hurricane Sally in Escambia County. In addition to these disasters, the department kept up with its regular duties of responding to emergency incidents, ensuring department-wide training, as well as continuously editing and improving department-wide policies and procedures.



OPERATIONS DIVISION

The department continued its pursuit of updating its digital infrastructure. In 2020, the agency began operating with the latest telecommunications equipment in all of their apparatus following the purchase of new mobile data computers. The department also edited its internal purchasing and receiving practices to coincide with the City's new budgeting software, BS&A. With respect to emergency response, the department in late 2020 began to analyze its use and deployment of emergency equipment to ensure rapid response and best customer service.

TRAINING DIVISION



Fire Department members are responsible for training during every shift. The Training Chief is responsible for providing the materials and tools to help our firefighters gain more insight and experience through fire ground application. While some training remains routine, the Training Chief works at finding ways to help individuals grow in many areas of the department.

The department utilizes an online training platform to assist in the delivery of training and education. These computer-based trainings assist in allotting time for practical applications in the field where crews are able to work through materials online and then see the reality of those scenarios, typically with Captain-led drills. The department trains monthly with area fire departments including Oldsmar, Dunedin, Palm Harbor, Tarpon Springs, and East Lake. Throughout the year, the Fire Department has trained and certified multiple engine driver/operators, truck driver/operators, acting captains, and acting district chiefs.

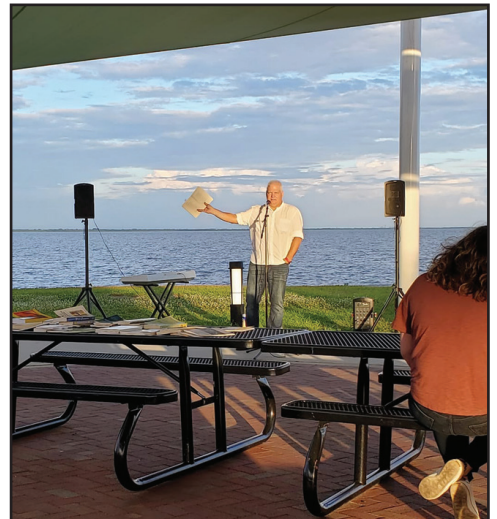
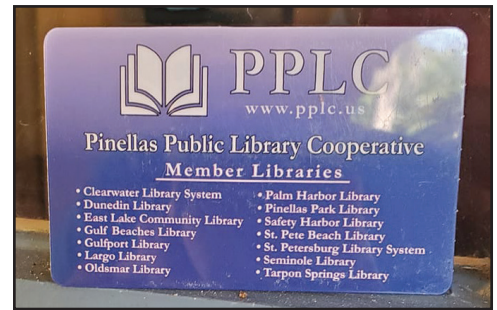

Public Works



FLEET

- Performed **671** preventative maintenance services
- Answered **1** roadside service calls to city vehicles
- Completed **111** small engine repairs
- Replaced and adjusted the brakes on **12** vehicles
- Successfully surplus aged/unusable City equipment and vehicles on GovDeals

SANITATION

Sanitation services remained constant even during the city's COVID shut down from March 24 through May 13 with help from Public Works staff from other divisions, along with two recreation employees. Yard waste collection was only suspended for 4 weeks during COVID closures.

Sanitation Division partnered up with Recreation for the 2ND Annual Shred Event held at Public Works. **455** cars came thru the line.

Responded to Hurricane Eta; assisted in Citywide clean-up efforts. Disposed of **150** Tons of storm debris.

- **1,507.93** tons residential recycling was collected curbside
- **223.78** tons commercial recycling was collected
- **158.88** tons of recycling was collected at the two city drop sites
- Collected **7,931** tons of residential trash
- Collected **3,749.63** tons of commercial trash
- Received **\$3,853.40** in recycling revenue for cardboard, mixed recycling and ferrous metals.
- Sanitation employees were only able to volunteer at **2** of the Pinellas County Chemical Collection events due to COVID shutdowns.





STREETS

- A total of **360** work orders requests were received and **257** were completed by the Street and Storm water Division.
- **152** cubic yards of concrete used to repair/replace driveways, ADA ramps, curbs and sidewalks.
- Recycling of dirt accumulated as a result of various city projects performed by city staff or city-hired contractors. This process involves the sifting of the material, which separates the debris from the usable soil. The debris is hauled to a dump site and the remaining soil is stockpiled and reused on future city projects. Hauled away **1,053.1** tons of debris from Public Works.

- Removal or trimming of **47** diseased or dead trees.
- Replaced **710** traffic signs due to new federal standards and installed new stop signs.
- Street sweeping debris collected equaled **315.74** tons.
- Completed various asphalt repairs using **42.4** tons of asphalt.
- Prepared for and responded to Hurricane Eta; assisted in citywide clean-up efforts.

STORMWATER



- Pamphlets, brochures and other informational and educational material are available at City buildings to increase public awareness. Information was also made available on the City's website.
- Placed **230** inlet stencil markers on city-wide catch basins identifying their purpose and importance.
- Maintenance of **26.29** miles of ditches and creeks annually.
- Cleaning and inspection of over **1,486** catch boxes within the city.
- Maintain compliance of permitted stormwater facilities as per SWFWMD requirements in conjunction with Engineering Department inspections.

- Excavated sediment deposits from ditches and reshaped eroded banks.
- Cleaned and inspected **42** outfall structures.
- Completed **21** erosion control or repair projects.
